Canada's Immigration Minister says the era of 'unlimited supply of cheap foreign labour is over."

During a recent speech to the Greater Vancouver Board of Trade, Canada's Immigration Minister Marc Miller said "the age of unlimited supply of cheap foreign labour is over," and higher wages need to be offered to attract Canadian workers. Miller emphasized the need to recognize and take action on the imbalanced relationship between employer and employees, especially low-cost temporary foreign workers, also known as migrant workers. The migrant worker crisis in Canada has involved exploitative relationships between Canadian employers and its foreign employees in low-wage labour sectors such as agriculture and food production.

To combat the issue of industrial reliance on low-wage labour, Canada has limited the amount of temporary foreign workers in many sectors and increased minimum wage during the past year. Together with this working solution, Miller addressed the need to increase enforcement and resources in removing temporary visa and work permit holders from staying illegally in Canada by hiring more Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) officers. A national shift in focus will be directed to Canada's permanent resident program for immigrants, and foreign workers with temporary permits can later claim permanent residency.



Miller also addressed the need for joint enforcement of the Safe Third Country Agreement, an agreement that manages the flow of refugee claimants in North America's shared land border. The proper regulation of irregular migrant workers by reducing temporary residents in Canada aims to enforce and maintain worker's rights. Most importantly, there should be a shift in national focus to providing assistance and acceptance to incoming permanent residents who are seeking refuge and asylum.

"Indigenous Bar Association appoints Stuart Wuttke to the Indigenous Peoples Counsel"



The Indigenous Bar Association (IBA) has appointed Stuart Wuttke, a prominent Indigenous legal professional Peoples Indigenous Counsel designation. This Indigenous legal trailblazer has been a member of the Manitoba Bar since 1996, the Ontario Bar since 2006, and currently serves as general counsel at the Assembly of First Nations (AFN). Wuttke has made significant contributions to the advancement and recognition for Indigenous governance and rights by influencing landmark legal initiatives of Indigenous peoples. For example, he has played a crucial role in implementing the Indian Residential Schools Settlement agreement of 2006 to enforce governmental compensation for Indigenous communities of injustices in Canada

Wuttke also contributed to an agreement that nationally addressed the discrimination against Indigenous children and youth in 2022. He further enforced human rights through the shaping of federal child and family services legislation. Wuttke's career has reflected commitment to fostering a new generation of Indigenous and non-Indigenous lawyers to advocate for Indigenous and human rights. This further promotes the reconciliation of Indigenous communities and Canadian society through representation and diversity in Canada's legal system.

Pollution to Preservation: The Rise of Environmental Law

Environmental law started as a critical field in response to the growing environmental impact of industrialization and the need for legal structures to prioritize both ecological and human health. The concept of "polluter pays", which originated in the 1970s from the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), has been the founding principle that has been holding polluters financially responsible for the damages they have caused and therefore prompting industries to adopt cleaner practices (OECD, 2008). This approach underscores a significant shift towards accountability in environmental policy, reflecting society's acknowledgment that those who harm the environment must carry the cost of rectifying their actions and this should not fall into the hands of the public or the future generations.

Environmental law had developed through key areas, including air pollution control and climate change mitigation. Air quality laws have sought to curb emission from industrial sources and vehicles, a priority following the severe health impacts of pollution seen in major industrial cities. The U.S Clean Air Act of 1970 set a precedent by regulating pollutants such as sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxides aiming to reduce the risks health and environmental degradation (United States, 1970). Today, these laws focus on limiting greenhouse gas emission and promoting adaptation strategies such as the Paris Agreement which is a landmark international treaty which shows us the global cooperation on climate action, aiming to reduce global warming and its subsequent impact (UNFCCC, 2015).



The effective enforcement of environmental laws relies on national agencies and international cooperation, such as the U.S Environmental Protection Agency. Their role towards enforcing penalties and supporting sustainable development goals is one that needs a crucial effect on today's environment. International treaties, like the Paris agreement, plays a crucial role by creating frameworks through which countries commit to shared targets and encouraging a unified global approach towards environmental protection (UNFCCC, 2015). As environmental issues continue to escalate, environmental law will remain important as it creates a medium to enforce and collaborate to address and challenge these complex issues.

ADVICE FROM EXPERIENCE

Always do your readings! Don't assume that you can pretend your way through lectures and seminars. Many of your essays will be based on your ability to incorporate core theories and concepts from the authors your professors cover.
